
A Tribute to Joe Walraven 10/27/1939 ~ 06/08/2021



It is with great heartache that we convey the news of Joe Lawrence Walraven's death on Tuesday, June 8, 2021.

Joe was 81 years old at the time of his death and led an amazing life. He impacted the lives of the people in his community and his companies for the better. Joe enjoyed a good story, a good laugh, a good hunt, and good company. Joe loved life and lived his to the fullest every day.

A little history on the great Joe Walraven. Joe was born in Texarkana, Arkansas on October 27, 1939. He grew up in Texarkana and graduated from St. Edward's Catholic High School in 1957. After graduating high school, Joe began working for Missouri Pacific Railroad (now Union Pacific Railroad). This was where his love for the railroad and railcars began. While working full time and raising a family, he attended Southern Methodist University. He earned a Bachelor's degree in Business from SMU in 1971.

After the completion of his degree, Joe moved to Ranger, Texas, to explore his entrepreneurial side. He started his first business adventure establishing Texas Rail Car Corporation as the first private railcar repair business in the nation. He sold this business in 1978 and once his management contract expired, founded his next business, JoeBob Oilfield Service. Joe was no stranger to taking risks in pursuit of success. Some of the companies he founded and/or cofounded include JM Texas Companies, LLC; Eagle Construction & Environmental Services, LP; Eagle Supply & Manufacturing, LP; Eagle Specialized Services, Inc; Fleet Equipment Leasing, LP; J&M Equipment Sales and Rentals, LLC; Texas Eagle Properties, LLC; Denali Services, LP; Eagle Remediation Services, Inc; JoeBob Oilfield Services, Inc.; Juneau Service Company; Eagle Railcar Services – Cairo, Ohio, LLC (Cairo shop); Eagle Railcar Services, LP (Elkhart shop); and Eagle Railcar Services – Roscoe, Inc. (Roscoe shop).

Joe was an extraordinary man. His work ethic was unparalleled. He worked hard and he believed in taking care of his people. He was diligent in teaching and training his employees. He willingly asked the tough questions and had the hard and often uncomfortable conversations needed to challenge a person to not only be better, but to be the best. He was always willing to help in absolutely any way he could. He expected the best of those he led but held them to the same standard he held himself. He could connect and conversate with every person, communicating their value in his eyes regardless of their history, background, education, wealth, or job position. He was described by one employee as "a man for every man".

During his lifetime, Joe was the president of multiple companies and currently, 13 of these companies are still active. The companies he was most known for are Eagle Construction and Environmental Services, LP., founded in 1993, and Eagle Railcar Services, cofounded in 2001 with his son, Marc Walraven. Eagle Railcar Services is now owned by Marc Walraven, who serves as the President of the company. When Joe founded Eagle Railcar Services, he owned two shops, one in Roscoe, Texas, and the second in Elkhart, Texas. Since that time, Eagle Railcar has now grown to ten locations across five states. Eagle Railcar Services employs over 1200 employees but has not lost the original goal or vision of its founder. Joe's original vision for each of his businesses was to provide excellence. The pursuit of excellence and quality is the mission of Eagle Railcar Services to this day. Joe used his shops to not only provide jobs for his employees, but also to impact the community around each shop. Several of the shops have provided opportunities for local students to tour the shops as a means to explore future careers in this industry.

Even after selling his interests in his businesses in 2016, his retirement was not what most people think of as retirement. His retirement included a series of development and construction projects which he continued to manage until his passing, as well as hunting and fishing all over the world. He loved to hunt some of the most sought-after exotic big game there was. His hunting and fishing trips took him all over the globe, to places like The Central African Republic, Tanzania, Cameroon, South Africa, Namibia, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Botswana, Zambia, Mozambique, Mongolia, Panama, Argentina, Canada, Spain, Hungry, Turkey, the Arctic, and the Amazon.

Joe and his wife Jennifer lived on their ranch in Ranger at the time of his death. Joe was also passionate in his personal life. He loved his ranch, the Rafter W, and was extremely proud of his Brangus herd. He was an avid international big game hunter, was a lifetime member of the Dallas Safari Club, and served on the Board of Regents for Ranger College for many years. He was featured in several hunting magazines including the Dallas Safari Magazine. Joe had a passion for business, hunting, fishing, and people. He never met a stranger and was authentically "Joe" everywhere he went. That might mean you'd get the blunt truth even if it were hard to hear, or it might mean you'd get a mischievous quote and/or joke that may or may not be a tad indecent. Joe was always genuine; he didn't put on a show for anyone. He enjoyed life and lived out the famous quote,

"Life is either a daring adventure or nothing at all."

Some of the Eagle employees whose lives Joe impacted wanted to contribute to this tribute. Here are their remarks:

*Joe – AKA – "the old man" - It's hard to put what he taught me into words. One thing was not to be afraid to take a risk, he didn't mind taking some risk for some reward. A great thing about Joe was his ability to read through the BS and get down to what was really going on in his plants by asking the same question four different ways. Honestly, there is a lot, but what I most appreciate about Joe was his willingness to listen to the everyday man. He was firm but fair in many situations over the years with Eagle. He gave me opportunity to take risk of my own, so for that I will always be grateful.

*Joe and Marc hired me exactly seven years ago, on June 6, 2014, and I have enjoyed knowing Joe both professionally and personally ever since. He would always tell me not to tell Marc what we were up to, but of course I always did. Marc never let on to Joe that he was "in the loop". Being the "Great White Hunter" that he was, Joe also liked to tell me about his upcoming Hunting & Fishing Adventures, and I could always count on (and look forward to) photos of his trophies in "real time" while he was away, along with descriptions in the message line such as "#1 or #2 such-and-such animal in the World!", or whatever Country or Region he was in at the time. I don't believe he would have ever been satisfied to kill any animal that wasn't "the-biggest-and-the-best", as that's just who Joe was, and I believe that's pretty much who Joe was in every area of his life. So, here's to Joe: The Biggest And The Best - I will miss you, Sir.

Joe lectured me on a purchase I made for an item that he also found at a lower rate. I remember him saying with a stern voice, "You can buy that same part all day long from this vendor for five cents less." Looking back, I've realized the value of money and savings. Every cent counts. Ironically, Eagle has grown from two to ten shops. Most importantly, when Joe had a question, you better have an answer. I will always be grateful for knowing Joe as a person and the opportunities he provided me through Eagle Railcar. I wouldn't be where I am today if it weren't for Joe believing in me. May his legacy continue for years to come.

*First, I should say anyone that knew Joe knows there are so, so many memorable moments, stories, conversations, and trips that it's impossible to put all of it in text. I knew Joe for almost twenty years, so there were many opportunities for those special memorable impressions that stay with you. I met Joe and Jennifer in early June in 2002. I remember Donna and I picking up Joe and Jennifer on a Saturday afternoon at the airport FBO in Beaumont, TX. Joe flew down to interview me for the Plant Manager position at Elkhart. They arrived in the twin engine turbo prop Commander. Joe showed me inside the plane and thought that was pretty cool. We had lunch at Ester's Seafood Restaurant in Bridge City under the Rainbow Bridge, BTW Ester's did not survive the coastal hurricanes. Joe interviewed me over a bowl of seafood gumbo. Joe offered the job and I accepted and that was the beginning of the incredible journey for me with Joe & Eagle Railcar.

A story I recall is an auction Joe and I went to whenever GE Railcar shut down their Texarkana repair shop. Everything, I mean everything was for sale and Joe went crazy, I think we all know Joe was like a kid in a candy store when it came to auctions. It wasn't long before the auctioneers knew Joe by name and kept a close eye on the rolled-up auction lot listings in his hand. We were working our way through the shop with the auctioneers, Joe bought "lot 88" that consisted of a few pallets of equipment. Joe poked my arm and said, "You see that pallet that has the bolt bin on it loaded with fasteners that is sitting next to our "lot 88"of course the bolt bin was in lot "87"! I told him, "yes I see it". Joe comes back and says "When the crowd gets down the aisle a little bit, get a magic marker, sneak back and change the 7 to an 8, of course I agreed. All seemed ok they rest of the day. Joe went back to Ranger that evening and I went back to Elkhart. I came back

the next day with a crew and Casey had a forklift delivered to load up our haul. OMG...when I got around to "lot 88" I was met with hostile auction mafia police and the very angry owners of lot 87 accusing someone of "doctoring" the auction number card.....I thought I did a good job! It was a very intense moment, and I wasn't sure what that outcome would be, but ended up working it out as a "mistake" and helped them load their pallet with the bolt bin. When the auction was over, Joe had bought two full 40' flatbed truck loads of shop equipment, minus 1 bolt bin. Needless to say, I was very apprehensive in joining Joe at anymore auctions as the previous plan didn't work out too well!

I worked for Joe for over 30 years, and I can still hear him hollering from the other end of the office "MURRY", and I knew this is how it was going to be (quoting Rob Clay), "I have never had my A-- chewed by any boss so bad and wanted to thank him when I walked out the door". I think that quote described the kind of boss Joe was. I will always miss him hollering "MURRY".

*I have been very fortunate to work for extremely intelligent and strong leaders who made their presence known throughout my life. I would rank Joe Walraven as the one of the very best. Joe was extremely intense, yet compassionate, he was intelligent, but connected with anyone, he was a strong businessman and very strong teacher. I have a lot of memories of Joe from the time I've known him, I could probably write a small book on some of his Joe-isms. He loved a good challenge or argument, and I can't remember a time he was wrong when we had those discussions, and he loved to make sure you stayed humble.

One humbling time I remember was on a scheduled visit by him to our shop. A few months after becoming a plant manager, Joe came in to inspect some exterior paint jobs with me. Obviously, I knew he was coming, so I'd went all out to impress him. I had the cars set up in a proper area, they were shining like new pennies! Our housekeeping was extraordinary. I made everything look pristine because I was not going to be embarrassed on this visit. As we walked out into the shop, Joe walked alongside one of the railcars. I was so proud; you could see yourself in the paint job. I even remember having my hand on the car touching it as we walked, I was so extremely proud of the quality of work we'd produced. When we got to the end of the car, Joe, who was not a young man at the time, took off his hard had, hit his knees, and crawled under the car! He crawled into the hardest to reach areas for inspection! He then bellowed, "Bull, get in here with me!" I crawled under and we then leaned over the side frame. He began to pick apart the paint job underneath that car in the hardest to reach areas. Less than 10 minutes into this inspection, I was now praying this would end quickly. After chewing the pockets off my jeans, we crawled out. He said, "if you don't get it right in the hard-to-reach areas, you don't get it right anywhere." He was basically teaching me you can't look at the obvious, it's about digging into the details. I learned the lesson then and there of how important it is for us all to dig into the details and don't settle for the obvious surface answers. Continue to ask the why questions.

Another thing Joe did was call me every Friday without fail. You could set your clock by his timing. Joe would always start the conversation with "well, how's your sales looking?" We would then get into conversations about shop performance or projects, everyday topics, but every Friday, what he was also doing was teaching me a lesson. One Friday in particular, he called, and his first question was "I want to know (his famous first words) why my wife can buy diesel for our ranch cheaper than you can for your shop?" This led into a long conversation about doing the proper homework to get the best price. Joe was famous for saying, "a penny and a penny will make a million." I learned that lesson from him that day and I never had to receive another phone call about my purchase price for diesel.

Joe meant so much to me professionally and personally and I can never thank him enough for the opportunities he gave me. Professionally, Joe allowed me and expected me to make decisions in my shop. If I got it wrong, he had no problem having the hard conversation. But I knew I never had to wait on Joe to get approval to make a decision.

Part of Joe's legacy was to empower those around him. He expected excellence and his teaching and training has impacted who I am today. He was also great at reminding me to laugh. One of the many Joe-isms I think of to this day is how he'd always say, "James, you're crazier than a runned over dog!" He said a lot more that might not be good to put in print, but every word spoken made you laugh, made you think, or made you better.

Joe had an incredible memory. I would argue with him about something that happened in the past. He would tell me, "let's bet on it". I learned over the years to never bet against him on anything. I still owe him a bottle of Crown!

I truly believe the Lord puts people in your life for a reason. Joe showed us all how to live life to the fullest! Sometimes we forget that our tomorrows are not guaranteed. He didn't waste a day that God gave him but made the most of it. I will greatly miss the man, the rebel....the legend! His memory will remain a part of all our future conservations that we will have with each other. Rest now, great warrior for the hunt is over!
